
Hello,

WE WILL BEGIN ACCEPTING APPLICATIONS FOR FALL FUNDING IN JUNE 2018

The ASETS (Aboriginal Skills & Employment Training Strategy) program focuses on both clients and employers to ensure clients engage in training programs that will directly lead to employment opportunities. Therefore, the ASETS program has very specific targets and parameters based on current labour market information in New Brunswick. The ASETS also has a strong partnership focus so clients are encouraged to explore other funding sources (i.e.: EI, TSD, Social Assistance, First Nations assistance, Other Aboriginal funding programs, Government Student Aid, School Grants, Employers, etc...) that can partner with the NBAPC-ASETS program.

Please contact the ASETS department in **June**, **July & August 2018** in order to apply for fall funding. Before applying for ASETS funding please gather all documentation you need from the school in order to apply, update your resume and apply for the "NB Free Tuition Program" (see notes below).

ATTENTION

THOSE ELIGIBLE TO APPLY FOR ASETS FUNDING

- Off-reserve Aboriginals who are permanent residents of New Brunswick
- Students enrolled in post secondary training courses that are 2 years or less in duration. (A client enrolled in a multi-year course must reapply for funding each year)
- Full time studies (full day training & over 20 hours per week)
- Training plans that coincide with current and future NB job market information based on the region the client is willing to work in.
- Courses where the training takes place at a school or training site.
- Those who are unemployed, underemployed or who do not possess employable skills

WHAT IS REQUIRED IN ORDER TO APPLY

- An acceptance letter from the training institution
- A schedule of ALL fees for the course from the school
- Documentation from the school stating the start date and end date of the training
- Address, phone number and fax number of the training institution or employer
- Contact person at the training institution or business

- A current resume
- If the client is currently drawing EI benefits their caseworker's name and contact information is required, as well as, the start and end date of their EI claim
- If the client is a Social Assistance Recipient their caseworker's name and contact information is required.
- Details and contact information of the other funding partners that the client has already secured funding from.

IMPORTANT ISSUES IN REGARDS TO POST-SECONDARY FUNDING

- Please be aware that we are required to follow a strict Confidentiality Policy, Conflict of Interest Policy as well as the Privacy Act. Therefore, any person who wishes to apply for funding MUST CONTACT OUR OFFICE DIRECTLY in order to apply for funding. Parents, family members, etc... cannot apply for funding on behalf of their relatives. The client who wishes to receive the funding must call themselves in order to apply for assistance.
- The Confidentiality Policy and Privacy Act also does not allow any ASETS staff member to discuss the funding details of any client with any other individual, no matter what relationship exists between the client and the individual inquiring. Client information is only shared with the funding agencies involved in the intervention, the training institution and the client themselves.
- Due to the Conflict of Interest Policy NBAPC Executive, Board of Directors and/or staff members are NOT eligible for funding through the ASETS Department.

We also offer an access room with computer, printer, popular software, internet access, fax services, books, videos, reference materials, career and educational resources.

2018 Canada Post Aboriginal Education Incentive Awards



Deadline to apply is August 31, 2018

ARE YOU ELIGIBLE?

Canada Post's Aboriginal Education Incentive Awards celebrate the hard work and determination of Indigenous peoples who have embraced a *renewed* pursuit of learning. The awards are open to all First Nations, Métis and Inuit peoples who have been out of school for one year or more, who have since decided to return to an educational system, and who have now been back at school for at least one year. The Canada Post Aboriginal Education Incentive Awards are granted annually to select applicants from across the country, and recipients are awarded \$1,000 in recognition of their efforts.

YOU ARE ELIGIBLE IF...

- 1. You are Canadian and a member of a First Nation, Métis, or Inuit community.
- 2. You have been out of school for one year or more.
- 3. You returned to school and have recently completed one year of studies (between January 2017 and August 2018).
- 4. You have never received this award in the past (previous award recipients are not eligible).

HOW TO APPLY:

- 1. Write an essay which details your efforts to get an education. Be sure to include any challenges you have faced in order to pursue your education, why you were out of school for one year (or more), and what life was like during that time. Your essay should also include the reason(s) you decided to return to school, any extraordinary challenges you might now be facing, and how you're dealing with those challenges. Tell us how your life has changed since you've returned to school and what your next steps will be. Your essay should be typed, double-spaced on letter-sized stationery, and no more than five pages long.
- 2. Complete an application form and return it by August 31, 2018. Be sure to include:
 - · Your essay,
 - School transcripts or school letter confirming you've completed one year of studies between January 2017 and August 2018 (photocopy is acceptable), and
 - A clear photocopy of your membership card or an official letter from a community member confirming that you are First Nation, Métis or Inuk.

LOFEO Symposium 2018

The Leadership team would like to thank all community, research and stakeholder partners who attended the May 9th-10th Symposium in Fredericton, New Brunswick. We would also like to thank Elder Alma Brooks for the opening and closing prayers.



Attendees gathered to welcome new community and research partners and plan for future research development. Research partners presented an in-depth overview of their work and reported on their project activities. Our community partners gave our researchers feedback and guidance for their next steps. This really helped LOFEO ensure that the research being conducted best reflects the needs of the community and that all research is community driven.

Some identified next steps are as follows:

- 1. Pilot a Helpline navigation service in New Brunswick.
- Develop an advisory circle with Quebec Native Women and the Native Women's Shelter of Montreal to conduct

- interviews and focus groups to collect data on MMIWG2S in the city of Montreal.
- 3. Collaborate with academic institutions to develop webinars for law students.
- 4. Establish a PEI research team to conduct research on LOFEO identified topics.
- 5. Collaborate with municipal police forces and local RCMP to review risk assessment tools.

LOFEO Travels To St. John's Newfoundland To Hold Sharing Circles



The Leadership team travelled to St. John's Newfoundland to hold Sharing Circles in collaboration with the St. John's Native Friendship Centre. The traditional Sharing Circles were led by the local Elder who provided the opening and closing prayers. Newfoundland and Labrador is home to several Aboriginal peoples therefore both the Qulliq (the traditional oil lamp used by the Inuit) and the smudge bowl were present to honor all traditions.

The goal of the Sharing Circles is to provide a culturally sensitive atmosphere for people to share their stories and experiences in dealing with the law, media and justice systems when a loved one has experienced abuse, gone missing or was murdered. The information gathered at



the Sharing Circles will be used to improve media, policing and justice system responses to missing Aboriginal women, girls and gender minorities and their families and friends.

In addition to the Sharing Circles, the Leadership team was invited to hold an open discussion during the centres 'Thimbles & Traditions' program. This is a program lead by an Inuit woman who teaches a traditional craft each week. This week's craft was the creation of traditional moccasins or slippers.

LOFEO Spotlight: Memorial University of Newfoundland (MUN)



"Environmental Scan - Indigenous Cultural Competency Training within Newfoundland and Labrador the traditional territory of the Inuit, Beothuck, Innu & Mi'kmaq"

The Memorial University of Newfoundland has been committed to collaborate on the LOFEO project since April of 2017. This team consists of Dr. Jennifer Shea, and Elizabeth Zarpa both located in St. John's, Newfoundland and Labrador. Their contribution to the LOFEO project has consisted of an environmental scan of Indigenous cultural training received by lawyers, police officers and journalists throughout their education to become a professional in their field. These professions are some of the few which come into first contact with the families of loved ones who experience violence or who have gone missing due to an alleged homicide. From January to April 2018, a total of ten key informants (seven lawyers, two journalists and one individual who was closely connected to the Indigenous populations in NL through a local grassroots organization) have provided information for the scan.



Jennifer Shea is an Assistant Professor of Aboriginal Health in the Division of Community Health and Humanities, Faculty of Medicine MUN. She has been working with Indigenous communities as a community-based researcher in both Saskatchewan and Newfoundland and Labrador since 2006. She completed a PhD in sociology specializing in Aboriginal Health at the University of Saskatchewan. In the division she teaches courses on Northern, remote and rural health as well as social justice. Prior to working at Memorial she worked in leadership roles within the provincial health care system for

eight years. Jennifer's research is communitybased and driven by community's needs. She specializes in participatory approaches such as photovoice.

Elizabeth Zarpa is Inuit from Labrador. She is a lawyer in Newfoundland and Labrador, and her legal work has been focused on criminal law, family law and most recently Indigenous legal traditions. She has worked with First Nations on Vancouver Island as part of the Indigenous Legal Research Unit at the University of Victoria where she finished her law degree in 2015. And she has also worked with Indigenous and settler communities in Labrador throughout her legal practice. She is currently finishing her Master's thesis in political science at Memorial University.



Listuguj Haven House

The Leadership team travelled to Listuguj First Nation in Quebec to meet with the staff at Listuguj Haven House. Haven House is a Aboriginal women's shelter that was established in 1991. It is a safe place, a refuge, for women and their children dealing with family violence. It provides a safe and comfortable place to stay for a limited time in crisis situations as well as counselling and emotional support.

Sheila Swasson, Director of Haven House, indicated that their staff would greatly benefit


from the Looking Out For Each Other project resources. They are happy to partner moving forward.


