New Brunswick Aboriginal Peoples Council strikes new partnership with Fredericton Police Force in hopes to creating better outcomes when an Indigenous person goes missing

Fredericton, May 16, 2019 - The New Brunswick Aboriginal Peoples Council (NBAPC), in partnership with the Fredericton Police Force, signed a letter of commitment reflecting a collaboration between the two parties to work together to ensure that risk assessment protocols and tools are responsive to the needs of Indigenous missing persons and their loved ones.

"We are thrilled to add the Fredericton Police Force as committed partners on the Looking Out For Each Other project. Their commitment to work openly with the team to see what has been done and what can be done better is refreshing." says Amanda LeBlanc, Interim President & Chief of NBAPC. "We commend Chief Fitch for being such a strong supporter of this initiative and we really look forward to working with the police ongoing to ensure Indigenous people are met with respect and the supports they need when a loved one goes missing."

The signing ceremony took place at the 2^{-1} Annual Looking Out For Each Other (LOFOE) Research Symposium. The two-day symposium highlighted the academic research confronting the issues of Missing & Murdered Indigenous Women & Girls, cultural sensitively environmental scan, MMIWG and the media, documenting the disappearance of MMIWG. Bringing together LOFEO's partners and network, community and academic researchers, stakeholders and the project advisory circle, this symposium opened the opportunity to a dialogue on the activities of the project and discussion of the next steps.

The signing of this letter signifies the Fredericton police's commitment to reconciliation with its constituents. "On behalf of the Fredericton Police Force, we are proud to be part of this important project. Looking Out for Each Other builds on the years of existing work we have done to build trust with Indigenous communities, including St. Mary's First Nation here in Fredericton. Specifically, on the Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls file. Thank you for having us here today, and we look forward to the ongoing partnership." says Leanne Fitch, Chief of the Fredericton Police Force.

The Symposium, happening May 16 and 17, 2019 in Fredericton, NB, will also present a piece about the National Inquiry and the role NBAPC and our sister organization, the Native Council of Nova Scotia, has taken in the inquiry process as parties with standing.

This letter of agreement is part of the community driven project Looking Out For Each Other: Assisting Aboriginal families and communities when an Aboriginal woman goes missing, led by NBAPC. This is a collaborative project, engaging other Aboriginal organizations, community members, universities and mainstream service providers in Quebec, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland & Labrador. The primary goal of the project is to empower Aboriginal organizations to provide well supported services to families and communities of missing people. This includes the recent establishment of a provincial helpline for the families and communities of missing Aboriginal people in New Brunswick.

Language Bursary

The Language Bursary is for NBAPC members who want to improve their language skills or want to start learning a second language: including but not limited to Mi'kmaq, Wolastoquyik, French, and English. The right applicant will possess a positive attitude to learn and speak the language.

Participants are awarded funding that covers tuition fees for the course, instructional materials and other course fees. Open to all members of NBAPC.

Must be 18 years or older. Applicants must submit an essay outlining the reason for receiving this award.

Deadline: Apply when accepted to a program. Bursary dispersed upon completion of course and/or proficiency examination.

Amount: up to \$750. Receipts required.



Educational and Summer Camp Bursary

The purpose of this award is to help parents to cover the costs to send their children to summer camp in New Brunswick. The bursary is open to all members of NBAPC.

The bursary will cover up to \$200 in camp fees and \$50 for other camp-related expenses per child/per year.

Deadline: Apply when registering child for camp. Bursary dispersed upon completion of the camp; receipts required.



Post-Secondary Education Assistance Bursary

Bursaries are provided to students attending university or college who are in need of financial assistance. Bursaries are open to all Aboriginal people who, or whose parents, are members of the NBAPC.

The bursary is available upon completion of a one-year course or the first year of a multi-year academic program.

A successful applicant will write a letter that details how the bursary will benefit their education and development.

This is a one-time bursary per applicant effective, 2019 academic calendar.

Deadline: September 30th

Health Sciences Bursary

This bursary is provided to support students in the health sciences at any university or college and in any year of study.

The bursary is open to all Aboriginal people who are or whose parents are members of NBAPC. Students must be enrolled full-time.

Recipients must have successfully completed at least one year of full-time studies at their university/college with a GPA of 3.0 or higher. Effective for the 2019 academic calendar.

Deadline: September 30th

NBAPC Membership

This month, Membership Matters has been working on translating the Community Local Manual into French to better serve Community Locals that operate in French. Membership Clerks will be sent an updated English and French version of the document in the coming weeks. If you do not receive the document and you would like it, please contact Membership@NBAPC.org for a copy. Feel free to contact us if you would like a printed copy sent in the mail.

Digitizing has started! We've estimated over 55,000 documents that need to be digitized and catalogued! As we work on this project, we will be reorganizing and sorting all Membership files. This overhaul should help us answer questions from Members and Applicants more quickly and easily, and stop any files from being lost or misplaced in the future.

NBAPC Natural Resources

NBAPC's Natural Resource Manager attended the North Atlantic Salmon Conservation Organization's annual meeting regarding the state of the Atlantic Salmon. The meeting was very informative and NBAPC learned of the multiple efforts undertaken by various groups around Canada and the U.S.A to conserve the species. NBAPC also shared information about its own conservation efforts. NBAPC was disappointed to learn that Greenland has overfished the Atlantic Salmon population during the past fishing season. Greenland had stated last year they would limit their catch to 20 tonnes per year, and they harvested over 40 tonnes in the last fishing season. This may result in lower amounts of Atlantic Salmon returning to the Atlantic region this year. We encourage all members to count Atlantic Salmon and report the numbers to naturalresources@nbapc.org. This will help us to contribute to conservation efforts.

If you suspect poaching of Atlantic Salmon, please contact your local DFO office.

NBAPC's also attended a workshop hosted by the World Wildlife Federation so we may work with WWF and many other organizations to implement a Priority Threat Management tool in the Saint John (Wolastoq) watershed region. The workshop was very informative and more information will be presented to the membership in the coming months. NBAPC is very excited to be a part of this innovative project.

New Program & Fall Funding Information

The ASETS (Aboriginal Skills & Employment Training Strategy) program ended on March 31st, 2019. It was replaced by a new program called <u>ISETP-Indigenous Skills & Employment Training Program</u>. This program focuses on both clients and employers to ensure clients engage in training programs that will directly lead to employment opportunities. The ISETP has very specific targets and parameters based on current labour market information in New Brunswick. The ISETP also has a strong partnership focus so clients are encouraged to explore other funding sources (i.e.: EI, TSD, Social Assistance, First Nations assistance, other Aboriginal funding programs, Student Aid, school grants, employers, etc...) that can partner with the NBAPC-ISETP.

The ISETP department will begin taking applications for fall training programs starting in **June**. Before applying for ISETP funding please gather all documentation you need in order to apply and update your resume (see list below).

THOSE ELIGIBLE TO APPLY FOR ISETP FUNDING

- Off-reserve Indigenous Peoples who are permanent residents of New Brunswick
- Students enrolled in post-secondary training courses that are 2 years or less in duration (a client enrolled in a multi-year course must re-apply for funding each year) or students enrolled in their last and final year of university studies
- Full time studies
- Courses where training takes place at a school or training site
- Training plans that coincide with current and future NB job market information based on the region the client is willing to work in
- Those who are unemployed, underemployed or **do not** possess employable skills

WHAT IS REQUIRED IN ORDER TO APPLY

- An acceptance letter from the training institution
- A schedule of ALL fees for the course from the school
- Documentation from the school stating the start date and end date of the training
- Address, phone number and fax number of the training institution or business
- Contact person at the training institution or business
- A current resume
- If the client is currently drawing EI benefits their caseworker's name and contact information is required, as well as, the dates of their EI claim
- If the client is currently a Social Assistance recipient their case worker's name and contact information is required
- Details and contact information of any other funding partners that the client has already secured funding from

IMPORTANT ISSUES REGARDING FUNDING

- All ISETP funding that a client receives directly or is paid on their behalf is taxable and the client will receive a T-4A during tax season that must be declared as income.
- Please be aware that we are required to follow a strict Confidentiality Policy, Conflict of Interest Policy, as well as, the Privacy Act. Therefore, any person who wishes to apply for funding MUST CONTACT OUR OFFICE DIRECTLY in order to apply for funding with an employment counsellor. Parents, family members, teachers, friends, etc... cannot apply for funding on behalf of others. The client who wishes to receive the funding must call an employment counsellor themselves in order to apply for assistance.
- The Confidentiality Policy and Privacy Act does not allow any ISETP staff member to discuss the funding details of any client with any other individual, no matter what relationship exists between the client and the

- individual inquiring. Client information is only shared with the funding agencies involved in the intervention, the training institution and the clients themselves.
- Due to the Conflict of Interest Policy NBAPC Executive, Board of Directors and/or staff members are NOT eligible for funding through the ISETP department.

We also offer an access room with a computer, printer, popular software, internet access, fax services, books, reference materials, career and educational resources.


